Through the Intercession of St. Peregrine...

I was asked recently if I had any stories about my experience as a hospital chaplain. I had been a full-time chaplain at St. John Hospital in Detroit for some ten years in my early days after my first assignment as a parish priest. And wherever I was, visits to the local hospital were always part of my regular ministry. I have found that helping people through a crisis is one of the most rewarding ministries we can have. Being a chaplain at a hospital with a major emergency room provided many memorable incidents. We dealt daily with victims of accidents, heart attacks, shootings, and many other types of injury, as well as spending time to visit inpatients to show personal interest and compassion for the sick. And we dealt extensively with the families of patients, helping them to cope with their fears and losses of health and life.

My ministry has provided many encounters, both tragic and joyful. But there was one encounter which stands out in my memory. I resided in our Servite community at St. John Berchmans church in Detroit, where I had begun my parish ministry. One of the parishioners there received an unpleasant diagnosis of Cancer, and went to the hospital for treatment. Three of us priests in the community went to visit her - Fr. Paul Onderbeke, Fr. Vincent O'Shea and I - and did our best to build up her hopes of conquering the disease. We offered our patient the sacrament of the sick, and the blessing with the relic of St. Peregrine. We were in good spirits, even to the extent of joking about the Solemn Blessing - referring to the ritual of a solemn high Mass, where three ministers served in the role of priest, deacon and subdeacon before the time of Vatican II.

As we were leaving her bedside the patient in the other bed asked also for a blessing. She, too, had been diagnosed with cancer, and was frightened about the possible outcome. We were most pleased

to be able to console her with the blessing of St. Peregrine.

Our parishioner's treatment was successful, and within a couple days she was on the road to recovery. When we next visited, her neighbor whom we had blessed was also leaving the hospital. She was thrilled to tell us that after our blessing she received the news that she was found with no trace of cancer, and was free to go home.



We are graced daily with many miracles: the wonders of birth and life, the blossoms of spring, daily sunrise and sunset, and many other natural wonders, and wonders of modern medicine. But it's rare that we can witness the miraculous cure of a nasty illness, and I think this event qualifies as a true miracle – the action of God's love for his people. It is an inspiration to us to thank our gracious Father for his generosity to us, and especially for providing us with so great an intercessor as St. Peregrine.
