I received a wonderful note from a cancer patient in remission, who also has had many back surgeries due to scoliosis. She finds it difficult to pray because of all the pain and her health limitations. She needs to use a walker to get around. But she has not given up on her neighbors as she knits prayer shawls for cancer patients and sends greeting cards out to parish members in the parish ministry for the sick. Now she prays for peace and acceptance for whatever God wants. She thanks all of us for our prayers for her, too.

As we hear in St. Luke's Gospel story (Lk. 5:18-20; 24-26), "Just then some men came, carrying a paralyzed man on a bed. They were trying to bring him in and lay him before Jesus; but finding no way to bring him in because of the crowd, they went up on the roof and let him down with his bed through the tiles into the middle of the crowd in front of Jesus. When Jesus saw their faith, he said, 'Friend, your sins are forgiven you...I say to you, stand up and take your bed and go home.' Amazement seized all of them and they glorified God and were filled with awe."



Questions to ponder: How do we visibly show that we do pray for God's people and creation, for all to go well? When have we treated strangers as

neighbors and what was the result? How can we become prayer partners with others, to ask God's healing blessing to help decrease one another's fears, stress and pain?

Action Task: Tell others that you are praying for their wellness. Become part of the St. Peregrine Prayer Partners and pray daily for others with serious illnesses. You can enroll as a Prayer Partner by writing to me.

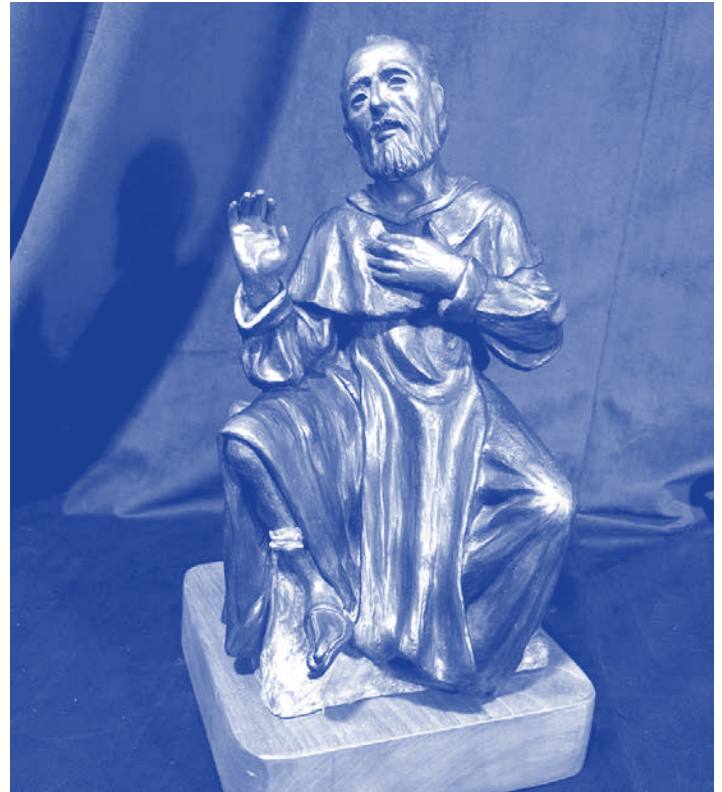

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## Never Alone – A Community of Support

It has been nearly an entire year since the Covid 19 pandemic began. Every person, family and relationship, in some small or large way, has been affected by this virus. One of its many challenging consequences has been the isolation of persons in quarantine, whether because of their illness, or as a way to avoid potentially dangerous contact with the virus. It has been difficult and sad, for many, to have cancelled travel plans and to have limited our celebrations, in-person or virtual, during this past Christmas season, when family and friends typically get together to enjoy the company of our loved ones.

As I look back on these last few months, however, I have given some thought and reflection to the deeper meaning of that Feast, and to the importance and value of our loving relationships. Even weeks after the celebration of Jesus' birth, I continue to be amazed at what God actually did for us in Jesus. He didn't have to share our suffering and pain, but lovingly chose to experience all of the ups and downs of our humanity, and so is truly "with us" in our illness, hurt and suffering, as well as in our joy and hope and laughter. Jesus knows what it feels like to be isolated, alone, wounded, even abandoned. However, having been raised from death to new life, He assures us that we are never really alone, even when we may feel as if we are. Sometimes, we know His presence best through others who care about us, and care for us, a community of compassion.

Just as Jesus called together an initial family of disciples, he continues to call an ever-widening circle of loving persons, whose mission, in part, is to assure that nobody has to suffer alone, or face their hurts by themselves. The Servite Order, which was founded by seven persons, not just one (celebrated in February), exemplifies that communal aspect of Jesus' mission, and the importance of relationship, which is truly at the heart of the whole spiritual life. Pope Francis highlighted this truth in his recent encyclical, *Fratelli tutti*. In the middle of

this pandemic, he writes, "we realized that no one is saved alone; we can only be saved together." The Gospel quoted by Fr Chris earlier is a great example of community collaboration!

Each of you who have been receiving this newsletter is related, in some way, to the Servite community. You are part of the ever-growing Servite family around the world. You have



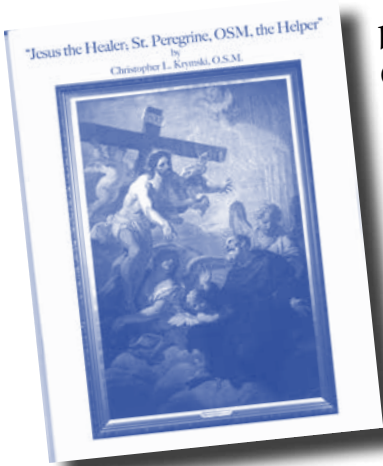
also come to know one particular person in our family ancestry, St Peregrine Laziosi, OSM, as a companion of all who suffer, and an especially good one because of his own illness, his trust in a healing God, and his ongoing intercession on our behalf. As alone as he himself might have felt that night before he was to have his leg amputated, his prayerful gaze was on a fresco of the crucified Christ, in which Jesus is not portrayed alone as he died, but is accompanied by Mary, his Mother and St John.

As a religious community, and extended Servite family, we also value the “community/family” of those who live with cancer and other serious illness, in the belief that nobody should suffer and deal with challenging illness alone. The pandemic has only intensified our desire to join your families, friends and caregivers as companions, to offer our faith, compassion and prayer, as support and encouragement for you, that you might experience hope, peace and healing. I am personally happy to join the Servite St Peregrine, OSM Ministry, and – along with Fr Chris - I look forward to ongoing communication with you, not only in the new format for our future newsletters, but also in some new forms of dialogue with one another, which we will be initiating in the coming months. Let us face our compassionate God, as we face cancer and illness...together, as community, and never alone.

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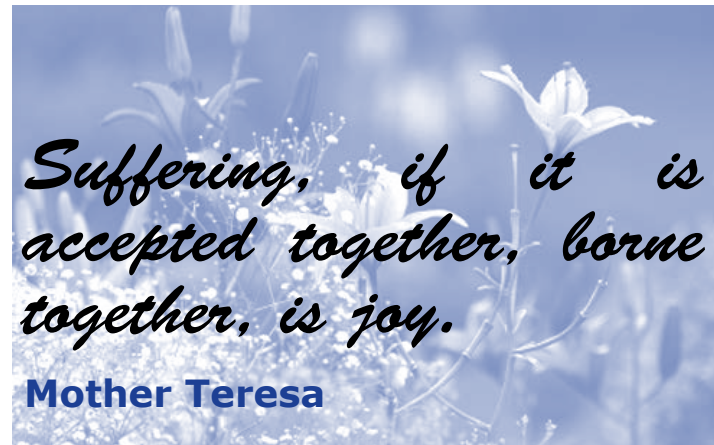
